What a year! In January, we held a well attended Parliamentary event for MPs and shipping industry leaders. In June, we received direct support and affirmation from Pope Francis during a Papal Audience. And in September we opened a new welfare centre for seafarers in Southampton.

On the horizon are more significant events. We officially change our name from Apostleship of the Sea to Stella Maris in 2020, to bring us in line with the global network and make us more recognisable to seafarers and fishermen. And we'll celebrate a century of care for seafarers and their families at our World Congress in Glasgow, in September.

These are the big markers on the journey. But more important is the simple care and compassion shown to more than 177,848 seafarers visiting our shores every day. What really matters is being the friend in port, the arm around the shoulder, the warm welcome to seafarers and fishermen. That kindness really changes lives.

None of it would be possible without the generosity of our supporters, who donated more than ± 1.49 m in 2019. I'm so grateful. Thank you for coming on board for this amazing journey, and for being with us as we set a course for another 100 years of ministry.

Steve spent an afternoon researching the issue – then drove the men to a ballot station in a church hall in Hull so they could cast their all-important vote.

Vital help in times of crisis

January 2019 saw the launch of our first Life at Sea report, and marked the start of greater collaboration than ever before between Stella Maris and the shipping industry.

As a result, our intervention in crisis situations almost doubled – from 45 incidents in 2017/18 to 80 in 2018/19.

Whether it was hospital visits, dealing with abandoned crews or helping resolve contract issues, we supported seafarers everywhere through some of the toughest times of their lives.

Support for crew after seafarer falls overboard

A crew was devastated after a Sri Lankan seafarer, who'd only just joined the ship and celebrated his 29th birthday on board, was lost at sea. Our chaplain, Fr Andrew Thavam, met the crew a day after the tragedy. He took the men off the ship to the seafarers' centre and offered counselling. "They were visibly more relaxed and in better spirits when they returned to the vessel," said Fr Andrew.

Help for Syrian seafarers trapped in port

When heavy seas dislodged a ship's cargo, the crew were forced to divert to Falmouth for three weeks. But the ship became a prison for the nine Syrians on board, as they were unable to leave port due to immigration rules. Instead, our chaplain John Pinhay visited regularly, bringing hats, newspapers and chocolates. "We shared stories, and we knew they appreciated our visits," said John.

Helping in the aftermath of a fight

After a fight broke out on a fishing vessel in the Seychelles, Stella Maris was called in to mediate. The drama occurred when the captain refused to let four fishermen leave, even though their contracts had expired and they were owed wages. National Director, Albert Napier, attended meetings to support the fishermen. "Good teamwork between agencies resulted in a positive outcome," said Albert, "and we went with the fishermen to the airport to board their flight home that same day."

Easing the stress of a broken dishwasher

It might seem trivial, but small things like a broken dishwasher can cause real stress. Chaplain Wojciech Holub visited a ship in Tilbury docks, and found an over-tired cook and a fed-up crew. They'd reported a broken dishwasher five times, but nothing was being done. Wojciech called our London office, who contacted the ship manager. Within a few weeks, a new dishwasher was delivered to the ship.

Faith on board

Long months at sea mean seafarers and fishermen rarely get to Mass – so chaplains and ship visitors make arrangements for this to happen on board whenever possible. We also provide faith resources, such as our Stella Maris magazine, prayer books and rosaries.

Ash Wednesday

Mass following a death at sea

Following the death of a colleague at sea, 19 crew members asked for a blessing on their ship when they arrived in Portsmouth docks. The men were distraught, grieving and seeking reassurance.

Our chaplain Peter Morgan arranged for local priest, Fr Peter Hard, to celebrate Mass on board and provide pastoral support. He said, "The mood on board was quite low and the tragic incident was still very fresh in their minds. Mass was celebrated in memory of the deceased crew member and after this, the atmosphere was more positive."

Ash Wednesday Masses

Port chaplains distributed ashes and celebrated Mass in ports around the country for Ash Wednesday, and even visited crew on board the P&O ferry Pride of Rotterdam in Hull.

Rosaries for seafarers

Seafarers love to receive rosary beads – and few are more precious than these Filipino tropical wood rosaries, made by the Grayshott Sisters in the Diocese of Portsmouth. The rosaries are blessed by Stella Maris chaplain Fr John Lavers before being passed onto seafarers and fishermen.

Stella Maris magazine goes global In March 2019 we began publishing our monthly faith magazine, Stella Maris, for seafarers and fishermen – and it's now being distributed in more than 76 ports around the world.

The magazine is in English and Ukrainian, which means most seafarers in the world can read and understand it, and it's free for anyone who wants a copy. The publication includes the Gospel reading for each Sunday of the month and a short commentary, as well as practical advice for seafarers and a poster and prayer to go on their cabin wall. Already, Stella Maris magazine is bringing joy to seafarers around the world. Chaplain Joe O'Donnell in Glasgow said, "I just left some crew on a first-time visit here, and they were delighted to receive a copy of the magazine."

Volunteer heroes

The work of Stella Maris would not be possible without the valuable contribution of our volunteer ship visitors. More than 118 volunteers work with chaplains at 73 ports across the country, and their presence means many more seafarers visiting our shores get the vital support they need.





At 24, Hannah Forrest is one of our youngest ship visitors. She joined the team in 2018, after graduating in psychology from the University of Plymouth. In 2019, Hannah won an award celebrating the contribution of young people to social action – and here, she reveals what inspires her about ship visiting.

Q. Why did you become a ship visitor in the first place?

A. I heard about it after Sea Sunday in 2018 and thought it was something I'd enjoy. I was unemployed at the time and really felt the need to get out and do something.

Q. What do you enjoy most about the

role? A. Meeting so many amazing and lovely people. It is a real privilege to be



invited on board a ship to meet the seafarers and hear about their lives.

Q. How did you feel to win the 'Million Minutes' Celebrating Young People award in July?

A. I was in complete shock! All evening we'd been hearing about inspirational young people doing amazing things, so to receive the overall award means a lot. After the shock wore off I was really happy!

Q. What would you say to others thinking about volunteering with Stella Maris?

A. Go for it! It is immensely rewarding, the organisation is beyond supportive, you meet wonderful people and provide help and support to seafarers who need it.

The Tees and Hartlepool team picked up the Shoreside Team of the Year Award during London International Shipping Week. It came after husband and wife ship visitors, Hugh and Mary Ward, stepped in to help a seafarer anxious about a debt greater than his annual salary.

Hugh and Mary gathered copies of hospital bills and asked a parish priest in the Philippines to visit the family and verify the facts. Before the ship left port, the pair had accessed the Stella Maris welfare fund to settle the debt. The seafarer and his wife were overwhelmed – and invited Mary and Hugh to be godparents to the three babies.

New Stella Maris seafarers' centre opens in Southampton

New seafarer centre for Southampton

A brand new Stella Maris centre was opened in Southampton in September 2019, giving seafarers a home-from-home as well as access to vital pastoral and practical support services.

The centre, in the grounds of St Joseph's church, just a short walk from the cruise terminal and port, offers free Wifi, TV, faith resources and tea and coffee facilities. Outside, there's a BBQ for summer entertaining. The centre was fitted out thanks to a grant from the Department of Transport. UK Maritime Minister Nusrat Ghani MP was at the opening. "This new hub will provide a vital space for seafarers and cruise ship crew to receive support, as well as acting as a resource and training centre for volunteers," she said. "I am delighted to support Stella Maris and thank them for the work they do."

First Director of Chaplaincy appointed

Fr John Lavers has been appointed Stella Maris' first UK Director of Chaplaincy. The former government crime and security specialist, from Canada, joined Stella

Launch of Life at Sea report

MPs, shipping executives and Stella Maris chaplains gathered for a UK Parliamentary event in January 2019 to mark the launch of our first Life at Sea report. The report, which details how Stella Maris works with the shipping industry to support

seafarers in crisis, was welcomed across the board. Kitack Lim, International Maritime Organisation (IMO) Secretary General, told the gathering, "I speak from the heart when I say how much I appreciate the work that Stella Maris does. Stella Maris provides the largest ship-visiting network in the world."

Nusrat Ghani MP, UK Maritime Minister, added, "There are many mixed crews of different nationalities and faiths and the fact that chaplains provide support regardless is absolutely unique. When regulation is not possible or effective, the mariner will always know the chaplain will be there."

The report highlighted that having a 'friend in port' is still vitally important for seafarers, even in our technological age. And in cases of abandonment, bullying and harassment, medical emergencies and refusal of shore leave, intervention by Stella Maris chaplains has a significant, positive impact.

New chair of trustees

Dr Esteban Pacha has been appointed as Stella Maris' new Chair of Trustees, after Simon O'Toole stood down after almost a year in the role. Dr Pacha, who had been Acting Chair of Trustees and before that, Vice-Chair, took up the position in July. A former seafarer on merchant vessels, Dr Pacha served as a captain before becoming a harbour master.

Meanwhile, CEO of the International Maritime Rescue Federation, Theresa Crossley, was appointed as Vice Chair of Trustees.

Stella Maris Masses

Masses to mark the feast of Our Lady Star of the Sea were held around Great Britain in September, and prayers were said for seafarers and fishermen everywhere.

In Hull, at St Charles Borromeo church, our ship visiting volunteer Keith Rodgers was commissioned by Bishop Terence Drainey. In St George's Cathedral, Southwark, newly installed Archbishop John Wilson celebrated a Stella Maris Mass as one of his first episcopal acts. In Jersey's St Thomas' Val Plaisant Church, supporters heard of the work around the country over a buffet following Mass. And in Glasgow, several seafarers and fishermen attended the Stella Maris Mass, celebrated by Archbishop Philip Tartaglia.









Support for Sea Sunday

Parishes all over Great Britain took part in our annual Sea Sunday celebration, to remember the hardworking men and women of the sea and donate to ensure seafarers get the support they need.

At the time of writing more than £456,460 was raised during Sea Sunday, which will help support 76,076 seafarers in the months to come. Around 1,506 parishes made use of the resources we provided, including posters, children's activities, inserts for bulletins and newsletters and a video.

John Green, Stella Maris Director of Development, said, "We are so grateful to the parishes and ordinary Catholics who support seafarers on this special day. Sea Sunday forms a significant part of our voluntary income, and means we can extend this vital ministry to more crews."

Seventy-year-old Jimmy Spriggs became a Stella Maris fundraising hero, after he walked the equivalent of Jersey to France and raised an incredible £700.

Jimmy took part in the annual 'Walk to France' fundraising event, run by our team in Jersey, in May. He trekked round all 18 laps of the route, and notched up a hefty contribution to the £2,000+ total raised on the day. Stella Maris – or Star of the Sea – is the name by which many seafarers know the Apostleship of the Sea.

It's the ancient title for Mary, the Mother of God. Traditionally, seafarers depended on the stars for navigation, and so relied on the protection and guidance of Our Lady.

Today, Stella Maris is the patron of Apostleship of the Sea.

Funding this vital work



Income £1.63m

Donations and legacy gifts received in 2019 amounted to £1.49m. If you sent a gift this year, thank you so much for your kindness and care. We particularly remember with thanks those who left donations in their wills.

Expenditure £1.79m

We've used these resources wisely and carefully to have the greatest impact. 19 chaplains in 73 ports around Great Britain were funded, and we've also helped the work of Stella Maris in South Africa and Ukraine.

Countdown to our 100-year anniversary

On 4 October, 1920, on the banks of the River Clyde, Glasgow, a group of Catholic men and women came together to form a new movement...

Their vision: to offer spiritual and pastoral care to seafarers and fishermen visiting our shores. The organisation they launched was called Stella Maris, Star of the Sea, and it soon became a beacon of light in an often-dark maritime world.

Today, Apostleship of the Sea (which in 2020 will revert back to its original name, Stella Maris) is in 55 countries, supporting more than a million seafarers every year.

In October 2020, chaplains, volunteers, supporters and seafarers from around the world will gather at the birthplace of global charity. Here, at the 25th World Congress, we'll give thanks for a century of care for seafarers and their families.
